## THE SCOTT COUNTY LIBRARY CAN HELP YOUR POCKETBOOK

Research Databases – Don't let the name fool you. These resources aren't simply for the school-minded. The Scott County Library System offers access to some fantastic resources that can help you use money more wisely. Using these resources is as simple as visiting our website, [www.scottcountylibrary.org](http://www.scottcountylibrary.org) and clicking on "Research Databases." From there, you can use your library barcode number located on the back of your card to open up the following money-saving helps:

- Know the best brands to buy when you make necessary purchases with our online access to Consumer Reports. This popular magazine can be seen, article by article, when you select **General Magazines** from our database page and type Consumer Reports in the Publication title. This online version of the magazine can be seen as a pdf file, which means you can see the articles and charts exactly like they appear in the physical form.

- **Value Line Investment Survey** is an online treasure trove of information about investing. Updated weekly, you can use this resource to track the market and know the best places to invest your money. This site is usually only available by paid subscription, but library card members can use this site for free. Simply click on the "Business Information" link on our databases and choose the **Value Line Investment Survey** link. After you enter your library card number click the tab that asks if you want to enter the Value Line site to start planning your investments.

- Do It Yourself Auto Repair with our subscription to **Auto Repair Reference Center**. This represents the most authoritative automotive repair information available to car owners. There are thousands of year, make and model combinations covering the most popular vehicles of the past 60 years, plus additional coverage of specialty models. Simply

choose the **Auto Repair Reference Center** listed under "More Helpful Information" and use your library barcode to access the database.

- Does your student need a little extra help with his homework? Your library card membership gives students free access to a live tutor every day from 4 -10 p.m. for everyone from kindergarten through college. Choose the **Free Online Tutor** link from our main page or the Research Databases page to get started.

The Scott County Library System can also help save money with your entertainment needs. With shared access to over 300 library collections, the PALS consortium lets Scott County Library System library card holders choose from a great collection of newly released DVDs and music. You can even place these items on hold through our online catalog. Click on the "Classic Catalog" option and select the Movies or Music tab. From there you can enter a search of the year of release or simply type in the title of your favorite film, television series, or music artist. Place a hold on the item, and we will call or email you to let you know when it arrives. You can use this same method to place holds on the hottest book and audiobook titles as well.

When thinking about saving money, don't forget that all of our Scott County Library System branches also have free Internet and wifi access. Save money on Internet access bills and bring your laptop into a branch or log on to one of our public use computers for your online needs.

Making the most out of your library card membership can help trim costs for your family. Best of all, getting a library card is free. Visit one of our branches to register for a card or visit our website to preregister and pick your card up. You'll be making a great step towards saving money.

## BIGGER CHALLENGE FOR NORTH SCOTT SCHOOLS 4TH-6TH GRADERS THIS YEAR

For the past 6 years the Scott County Library System and the North Scott Schools Teacher-Librarians have teamed up to challenge 4-6 grade students to a reading competition. Students pour over the current year's Iowa Children's Choice Award books in preparation for a Battle of the Books. Students form teams of three at their schools and battle each other over trivia questions about the books. The top teams from each building go on for a large Battle at the Scott County Library System. There schools compete against one another for the honor of having the traveling trophy at their building the next year. This year the challenge will be even greater. The Scott County Library System has teamed up with several other regional libraries and will be hosting a regional final in the spring. The top team from North Scott Schools will go on to battle at least 3 more schools in a final regional event. This collaboration resulted after youth librarian, Crystal Kehoe, presented on

## NEWS FROM THE DIRECTOR

### WHAT IS A RESEARCH DATABASE?

Research databases have been available in public libraries in significant ways for five to six years. Prior to that, they were confined to academic libraries, generally on CDs and were not very user friendly. Today they come over the Internet in various forms, topics and from respected publishers.

So what is a research database you ask? It is a collection of information organized in such a way that a computer program can quickly select desired pieces of information. You can think of a database as an electronic filing system. Housed in these databases are articles and reports from magazines, scholarly journals, encyclopedias and more.

In periodical literature (remember Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature?) you were able to look for articles in hundreds of magazines by author, subject or title. There were always three major drawbacks to this print resource: Articles were generally several weeks old, you didn't know if the library had the magazine, and you were not sure if the article did in fact contain the information you wanted.

Databases work in much the same way, but without these traditional drawbacks. Today, for example, you can go to our General Magazine database and search for an article,

let's say on Health Care in 2009. I did just that, and my result shows 50 articles for 2009 that are full text. I can read them or print them for further use. The date data I was searching on was August 31, 2009 and articles appear for 10/01/09; 09/09/09; 09/07/09; all the way to January 2009. Not only are articles current, they often are available here before the printed magazine hits the newsstand. This same database searches newspapers if asked.

Databases, such as the one above, are available to libraries for a price, naturally. They are published by publishers well known in their field as being reliable, accurate and timely, such as Wilson, Grolier, Britannica, World Book, Value Line, EBSCO and Facts on File. These companies put their expertise in research materials and modern technology to work providing the researcher with information at their fingertips. One can search using subject, author, title, keyword and set parameters for the search limiting or expanding the material the computer presents.

Unlike Google, Yahoo or other search engines, databases provide only peer reviewed material and are identical to their print forms in all respects, except one. Databases are updated regularly, unlike their print material that comes out yearly or less often. This means that if a new planet is discovered, for example, you don't have to wait for the next revised print copy to be published. As soon as the researchers are ready with the new material it is put into the database. It will also appear in the next print volume, whenever that is published.

In summary, databases provide accurate peer reviewed material to researchers and students. These are provided by Scott County Library System and can be used from home computers or at the library for free. They are footnoted as print sources and carry the same high standard credentials as their print counterpart.

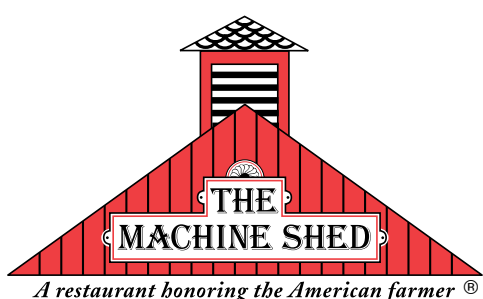

#### Free engine repair manuals online

Our new database, Small Engine Repair Reference Center is now available from our website. All you need is your library card. You are not blocked access if you have fines. This database is easy to use and contains instructions and diagrams to help you repair and maintain small engines in boats, ATVs, lawn mowers, tractors, and more.

Don't forget, we also offer our Auto Repair Manuals online! Just go to our website at [www.scottcountylibrary.org](http://www.scottcountylibrary.org) and click on Research Databases. This free information is available 24/7.

#### Instant Message A Tutor

Scott County Library again offers help from real, live tutors right at the library on our website, [www.scottcountylibrary.org](http://www.scottcountylibrary.org)

Live Homework Help is available for K - 12 grade and college level students daily from 4 - 10 p.m. This program connects students to a real live tutor. Children and young adults visiting the library website simply click on the "You've got homework" banner on our homepage and enter their library card number, grade level, and the subject in which they need help. Within a few minutes or less, they are connected to an expert tutor. Students can receive help in math, science, social studies or English. You can even send an essay or report to a tutor to be proofread! The site also includes 24/7 access to practice tests, worksheets, and resources.

#### Online job counseling and resume review

New from our Live Homework Help database is a Career Center for adults. This Career Center allows job seekers to connect

instantly with a career counselor who can aid in job searches and creation of cover letters and resumes. One-on-one counseling is available daily from 4 - 10 p.m. Available 24/7 from the site are sample resumes, letter and resume templates, and writing tips.

To access this service, click on the "You've Got Homework" banner on our homepage and enter your library card number. Then click on Career Center. You are not restricted access if you have bills or fines.
